
A POSY PICKER'S PAPER

Green Thumb Corner

It's September, and we might find ourselves feeling a bit depressed about shorter daylight hours and cooler temperatures. But, just as our Moms always knew how to cheer us up when we were sad, Mother Nature does the same by providing us with her magical show of color as the leaves of our local deciduous trees transform from their a quiet green of summer



into a palette of vivid reds, golds, oranges and yellows for fall. Among the prettiest trees are Maples, Aspen, Dogwoods, Redbud and Pear trees.

But, is this transformation the result of Mother Nature waving her magic wand, or is there something else going on here? You guessed it! This isn't as mysterious as it sounds. Get ready for some interesting trivia about autumn, it's colors and the effects on all of us:

- The beautiful reds, oranges and yellows of fall are actually there in the trees' leaves all year, just hiding under the surface. During the summer months when leaves can get lots of heat, water and energy from the sun, and lots of chlorophyll is present, leaves are green.
- As winter approaches, and days get shorter and cooler, it is more difficult for leaves to produce food, and so they start using food stored away for this time of year. This process continues until the food is gone, allowing the true colors of the leaves to show through before the leaves turn brown, die and fall.
- In the absence of it's leaves, the trunk and branches of deciduous trees still get food from their roots, which supply water, vitamins and minerals from the soil. Winter actually affords trees a well-earned rest from the energy-intensive work of photosynthesis while their leaves are present.
- The best fall colors are seen after a series of warm days followed by cold (but not freezing) nights.
- Fallen leaves are an essential part of a forest's ecosystem because they provide protection for the tree's seeds to germinate over the winter.
- While folks in our country typically use the word "fall," for the season following summer, the British use the word "autumn." Both terms date back to the 16th century. Previous to that time, the season was called "harvest."
- The term "equinox" is from the Latin meaning "equal night." The fall and spring equinox occurs when, in most places on Earth, the daylight lasts just about as long as the nighttime. The fall equinox this year is September 23rd!
- Leaves eventually turn brown because of tannin, the same substance that gives tea its staining power. At this point they no longer receive any nutrients.
- Dead leaves make great mulch. Just make sure the leaves you use are from healthy trees!

We already know that the cooler days and shorter daylight hours affect insects, birds and animals, sending some to warmer climates and others into hibernation, but did you know that the change in season affects us humans as well?

- Autumn babies born between September and November are more likely to be more athletic and to live to 100 than those born at other times during the year!
- More babies are born in September than in any other month during the year.
- During spring and summer, most people eat more carbs. In fall, they crave fattier foods, which leads to seasonal weight gain. Low levels of vitamin D may also play a part in adding pounds.
- Swedish researchers have found that women lose more hair in fall. It is thought that women hold on to their hair during summer months to protect the scalp from the midday sun.
- Testosterone levels in both men and women spike higher in autumn than at any other time during the year. As a result, men find women even more attractive in autumn than during summer months. Men are more likely to cozy up with their sweethearts and watch romantic comedies in fall! Apparently, feeling cold activates a yearning for warmth and comfort with others.♥
