## Green Thumb Corner

Holiday time is approaching quickly now, and many of us may be planning for trips out-of-town to visit family or to just enjoy some glorious time away at this very special time of the year. It's always a busy time getting ready for traveling...we all know the drill! Plan your wardrobe and pack your bags...check! Arrange for pet care...

check! Prepare your home for your absence...check! Everything all set? Not so fast! What about your beloved houseplants? Are they ready to take care of themselves while you are on your adventure? Hmmm...what to do?

If you lived in London, one option would be to check your plants into the very first 5-star, all inclusive botanicals-only plant hotel, known as the Patch Plant Hotel. While this hotel isn't as yet open year round, what a concept it is! Your plants are looked after by a team of specialists who see to it that your darlings stay hydrated and happy while you are away. They receive a check-up from a wellness team, which includes a custom hydration spa treatment. Sounds just perfect, doesn't it? Alas, this place is the only one like it so far. Absent this option, if you will be away for more than a few days to a week, here are some tips on how to keep from returning home from your peaceful and calming time away to a house full of wilted, dried-up and shriveled plant material inhabiting the places your prized plants used to occupy before you left on your adventure:

- First and foremost, leave your houseplants well watered and move them out of direct sunlight. Also, turn down your thermostat so that temperatures during your absence remain between 60 and 65 degrees.
- Ask a plant-savvy friend to tend to your plants a few times a week, perhaps in exchange for your providing the same service in return. A non-plant-savvy friend will also do, if you provide detailed instructions as to how much water to provide your sweeties, and at what intervals of time. Be sure to measure the amount of water you provide your plants, and pass this info on!
- If you don't have anyone you can call on to attend your plants, another option is to make your very own mini-greenhouse using a large clear plastic bag. Place the open bag on a waterproof floor...even a bathtub or shower will do. Line the bottom of the bag with a moist towel, and arrange as many well-watered potted plants as will fit on top of the towel. Place a few stakes into your pots to insure that the plastic does not rest on the foliage of your plants. Pull the sides of the bag up carefully, and blow some air into the bag to expand it. Seal your bag securely with a twist tie, and you will be good to go.
- Another option is to line the bottom of a shallow tray with pebbles, adding water just to the top of the rocks, and then placing your well-watered plants on top.
- For large plants, placing several layers of damp newspaper over the top of the soil will help keep the top surface from drying out and the roots moist.
- Set up a wicking system with some absorbent wicking material such as thick yarn or strips of an old cotton T-shirt, and a container to hold water, such as a bowl, pail or a bottle. Set the container of water next to your plant, and place one end of the wick into the water, all the way to the bottom of your container, and the other end about three inches into your plant's soil. It's best to set this up ahead of time and make sure your system is working before you leave!
- And, if you would like to do a bit of shopping, there are several houseplant self-watering systems available for purchase on-line!

Hopefully, some of these tips will help keep your houseplants alive and kicking until your return, and happy travels!
