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### FALL SEASON BEGINS

As we put our gardens to bed for the winter, we can look forward to the upcoming year of Garden Club programs and events. This year promises to be filled with interesting and enjoyable activities centering on conservation, education, floral arranging, crafts and civic projects.

Our year has already begun with two very successful activities. Teaming up with New Meadows Garden Club and the Topsfield Agricultural Commission, we created a first-prizewinning float for the Topsfield Fair Parade. This is our fifth year in the parade and we have won a first place award three times and second place twice! A series of workshops and the efforts of Dan Philpot and Peter Mulholland turned a

tractor and hay wagon into a pirate ship, complete with sail and rigging, flowers, a treasure map and chests, all crewed by the Guinee, Mulholland, Parisi, Magner, Smercyznski and Aftandilian buccaneer youngsters.

The Topsfield Garden Club is the local sponsor of the National Garden Clubs' 2009 Smokey Bear and Woodsy Owl poster contest for children in grades 1-5. On October 17th, we joined the Topsfield Fire Department and the State Department of Conservation and Recreation at Steward School for an assembly about preventing forest fires. Smokey Bear made an appearance to the delight of the children. At Proctor School, the information has been given to

the Art teacher. Fliers explaining the contest were distributed at both schools, so we hope to see some creative entries.

Collaborating with other community groups leads to innovative and productive activities that further our efforts in education and conservation.

### POMANDER WORKSHOP

Our November meeting will be a workshop at Chris Smercyznski's home on November 12th at 9:30 AM. We will be making pomander balls (painlessly!). The warm fruit and spice fragrance of these balls is perfect for the holidays.

Pomanders were very popular from the 15th to 17th centuries. From the French *pomme* 

d'ambre, "apple of amber," the pomander was made of perfumes, such as ambergris, musk or civit. Pomanders were worn or carried in a little container to ward off infection or bad smells, both most common in the Middle Ages. The containers were usually perforated and made of gold or silver. Some could hold more than one perfume.

In our modern age, we enjoy the delightful fragrance for its own sake and the pomander for decoration. If you have a favorite ribbon to add, please bring it to the workshop.



### GARDEN THERAPY

Another of our traditional activities is in need of a leader. For many years the Topsfield Garden Club has visited the Cedar Glen Nursing Home in Danvers on the third Wednesday of the month. We take cookies or other baked goods, visit with the residents, and provide music, thanks to Bill Flagg. In the Spring, we plant annuals in the garden to brighten the view. We

have members who are willing to bake or participate in visits, but we need someone to coordinate this activity.

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#### NATIVE PLANT GARDEN DESIGN

The South Main Street beautification project, a multi-year effort to improve the frontage between Maple Street and Route 1, has begun. A number of groups, including various town boards and departments, the Main Street Foundation, the Boy Scouts, and others, are involved in one way or another. Poison ivy and dead trees will be removed and new trees planted, if necessary. The stone walls will be reset and a walking path installed on the south side of South Main Street

between Maple Street and Salem Road. The goals are to restore this entryway to Topsfield's village area to its former more attractive appearance and to provide a safe walking area for all.

The Conservation Commission has already approved the project. Included in the Order of Conditions is permission to install plants in front of the walls to add seasonal color. Native species should be considered for this road-side area, not only because

they are historically appropriate but also because they have the best chance for survival without becoming invasive.

A plan is needed for this planting area. We have been asked if we could help develop a concept, including types and numbers of plants. If anyone would like to work on this project, please contact Martha Morrison at 978-8887-6273. Surely, with all of our gardening experience, we can make some helpful suggestions.


The original committee will be
